United States Ship Thresher (SSN 593)

Designed and built by the men and women of Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, the keel of USS Thresher (SSN 593) was laid May 28, 1958.

In the early morning of April 10, 1963 off the coast of Cape Cod, Thresher began her final mission.

"We are experiencing minor difficulties, we have a positive up angle, and are attempting to blow. Will keep you informed," she reported to her escort ship USS Skylark (ASR 20) just after 9:00 a.m. Shortly after, following an eerie rumble from the depths, there was silence.

Beneath the crushing depths, one hundred twenty-nine men were taken to their abiding resting place at the bottom of the sea, in an utterly final and terribly tragic loss of man and machine.

After an extensive underwater search utilizing the bathyscaph Trieste, oceanographic ship Mizar and other ships, Thresher's shattered remains were located on the sea floor, some 8400 feet below the surface.

Deep sea photography, recovered artifacts and an evaluation of Thresher's design and operations permitted a Court of Inquiry to determine that she probably sunk due to a piping failure, subsequent loss of power and inability to blow ballast tanks rapidly enough to avoid sinking.



Over the next several years, a massive program was undertaken to correct design and construction problems on the Navy's existing nuclear powered submarines, and on those under construction and in planning. Following completion of this effort, the Navy has suffered no further losses of the kind that so tragically ended Thresher's brief service career.

From this tragic event the Submarine Safety (SUBSAFE) Program was established to assure implementation of recommendations resulting from findings of the Thresher Court of Inquiry and Thresher Design Appraisal Board. Today the technical and administrative requirements of the SUBSAFE Program continue to evolve, though the program's purpose remains resolute to provide maximum reasonable assurance that seawater is kept out of the submarine and that the submarine and crew can recover if there is a seawater casualty.

Today, America has the strongest and safest submarine force in history, and the men and women who go down to the sea in ships, leaving their friends and loved ones ashore, can rest a little easier in the knowledge that their safety has been assured by the men of Thresher.
